### **OPENING ADDRESS**

# Major General Nick Cowley OBE Director Leadership



Major General Cowley joined the British Army in 2000 and commissioned into The Queen's Royal Hussars with whom he conducted tours of Kosovo and Iraq. From 2005 he commanded at both troop and squadron level in a specialist unit. During that time, he conducted multiple tours of Iraq and Afghanistan before being wounded in 2013. On recovery, Major General Cowley served as the Chief of Staff of 16 Air Assault Brigade in 2014/15 before studying for a Masters Degree in Planning and Strategy at the US Joint Advanced Warfare School in Norfolk, Virginia. In 2016/17 Major General Cowley deployed to Iraq as part of the coalition to defeat ISIS before assuming command of The Queen's Royal Hussars in Germany.

On completion of unit command in 2019, he worked as the Military Assistant to The Chief of the General Staff before assuming command of 16 Air Assault Brigade in 2021. As a Brigadier, he was appointed Commander of the Combat Manoeuvre Centre in July 2023. In October 2024, Major General Cowley was appointed as Commandant Royal Military Academy Sandhurst, which has now merged with other training organisations to form Army Individual Training Command (AITC); an organisation which trains all new officers and soldiers across the Army. He is also the 2\* advocate for the Army Multicultural Network. Major General Cowley is married to Katherine and they have three daughters. In 2011 he founded The Talent Tap, a charity which helps underprivileged school leavers achieve their potential. More recently he founded a not-for-profit called Future Forces, which aims to attract more talent and technology into defence and security. He has been awarded a QCVS in 2009, an MBE in 2015 and an OBE in 2019.

Natalie Billingham is Akamai's Senior Vice President of EMEA Sales and Channels and Managing Director-EMEA, based in London. She leads growth and go-to-market strategies across Europe, Middle East, and Africa. With over 25 years in technology, she's worked at firms including Exodus, SAVVIS, and NTT Ltd before joining Akamai in 2007, bringing deep expertise in telecommunications, cloud, and business services technology.

# **Prof. Alan Brown**University of Exeter



Alan Brown is a distinguished expert in digital transformation and AI strategy. His work centres on the intersection of technology and business innovation, where he is a respected voice on developing agile approaches to technology adoption and navigating the complexities of the modern digital economy. Alan's primary focus is on empowering these organisations to develop robust digital transformation roadmaps and effective AI strategies, enabling them to ask more

insightful questions and foster sustainable growth.

Drawing on his PhD in Computer Science and a Fellowship in the British Computer Society, Alan has published several books on scaling Al adoption, business transformation with digital technology, and enterprise software delivery. He also publishes weekly articles that explore the multifaceted impacts of Al and digital technologies, offering valuable insights to a wide audience.

# **Brig Rich Byfield MBE**Army Head Digital and Data



Rich Byfield was commissioned into the Royal Corps of Signals in 1994. Early service was spent supporting deployable formations, in HQ Field Army, and with Other Government Departments. Operationally he deployed on multiple occasions to Bosnia, Kosovo and Iraq. Following Advanced Staff training, he served in the Army Directorate of Operations and was awarded an MBE during this time. Attached to Cabinet Office for COVID-19 planning, he gained an insight into national resilience. On promotion he took on the dual role of Deputy Commander 1 (UK) Signal

Brigade / ACOS G6 in HQ ARRC. His final appointment before promotion to Brigadier was Chief of Staff to the Army Chief Information Officer. Brigadier Byfield started as Army Head Digital and Data in October 2024, responsible for Army AI and Data Governance, Data Protection, Business IT, Data Analytics, Information Interoperability.

# **Lt Col Arthur Dawe MBE**Experimental Training Group



Lt Col Dawe joined the British Army in 2001, commissioning into the Scots Guards. Initial postings included the Guards Training Division and to London on ceremonial duties. He then served in Northern Ireland, Kosovo and Iraq. Further postings included Poland, Canada and Germany as well as further operational deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan where he commanded at both Troop and Squadron level. He worked in Joint Capabilities in the MoD during SDSR10

and is experienced in several other key Staff appointments, both in the MoD and in the Field Army. In 2018, Lt Col Dawe deployed to Iraq as part of the coalition to defeat ISIS before becoming Chief of Staff of the Combined Staff and Tactical Training Group (CSTTG). In 2020, he successfully completed a Master's degree in Planning, Strategy and Risk Management at the UK's Advanced Command and Staff Course (ACSC). He then became SO1 Assurance in the Land Warfare Centre (LWC) before assuming command of the Army Trials Unit (ATU). On completion of unit command in 2024 he became Chief of Staff of the Army's Experimentation and Trials Group (ETG).

# **Claire Fry**Defence Digital



Claire Fry was appointed Director of Functional Integration for the Ministry of Defence Digital Function in February 2021. As Digital Head of Profession, she leads the People agenda and works closely with the CIO community to ensure cohesion across Defence. Her responsibilities include overseeing the £4.6bn Digital Portfolio, reporting governance to the Defence Board, and leading the Digital Skills for Defence Programme. Claire has over 20 years' experience in Defence, primarily in Digital roles. She has served as Head of CIO in a TLB, setting Information strategy, improving IT

efficiency, and delivering business value. She has led major Digital Programmes and established the first Digital Apprenticeship and Graduate schemes, supporting up to 14,000 Digital Professionals. Her portfolio experience spans up to £26bn, and she is well-versed in ITIL processes such as Configuration Management and Business Change. As a Certified Management Consultant, she led Defence's internal consultancy team, which earned IBC premier practice status for its work in business process engineering, organisational development, and team building.

#### **Lt Col Haydn Gaukroger OBE** Army HQ



Haydn Gaukroger is a reserve Lt Col working for Army HQ on the development of uncrewed systems. Retiring from active service in 2024 after 23 years in The Parachute Regiment, he now leads on strategy and product development for an autonomy startup. His military career was underpinned by three themes: special operations, capability development, and Ukraine. The latter part of which was focused on autonomy and AI in support of Ukraine. Significantly Lt Col Gaukroger developed and led

the UK's £0.5bn Ukraine-facing Drone Programme following Russian escalation in 2022 within Task Force KINDRED. Projects included both maritime and air domain autonomy, and the development and large-scale, serial production of one of the first long-range one-way effectors programmes outside of Iran, Russia and Ukraine.

# **Jenny Griffiths MBE**Oracle



Jenny Griffiths is Vice President of Al Innovation, working on embedding Al capabilities across Oracle's Fusion Applications. She focuses on bridging the gap between proven technologies, emerging possibilities, and real-world customer needs. She also serves on the UK Country Leadership Team, supporting the company's strategic initiatives across the region.

Jenny has received recognitions including an MBE for Services to Innovation and the Princess Royal Medal

for Contributions to UK Engineering. As the founder and former CEO of Snap Vision, a ground-breaking AI visual search platform, she has been recognised as one of the top 50 women in tech in Europe and the world by Forbes.

#### **Joyce Hakmeh** Chatham House



Joyce is the Deputy Director of the International Security Programme at Chatham House, where she plays a leading role in shaping the programme's research and strategic direction. She oversees a portfolio of work on arms control, technology and security, cyber policy and conflict prevention, and manages a team of researchers contributing to these areas. Alongside her leadership responsibilities, Joyce is also a Senior Research Fellow specialising in cyber

policy. Her research focuses on international cyber diplomacy, state behaviour in cyberspace, cybercrime, and the intersection of technology and security. She is also the commissioning editor for the Journal of Cyber Policy. Prior to joining Chatham House, Joyce worked with the United Nations, the International Federation of Red Cross as well as other non-profit organizations. Joyce received her Master's degree in International Law from SOAS, the University of London.

# Chris Loveday Barton Peveril Sixth Form College



Chris Loveday is an education leader and Vice Principal (Business Services) at Barton Peveril Sixth Form College, where he is driving a transformative shift in how AI is applied to education management. With a background in business services and operational leadership, Chris has spearheaded the strategic integration of artificial intelligence across key functions within the college to enhance efficiency, empower staff, and deliver measurable impact.

Chris has worked in education for over 21 years in Secondary Education (10 Years as a School Business

Manager) before transitioning to leadership at a Sixth Form College. Chris is a serving member of the AI in Education Strategic Committee and Chair of the newly formed CFO/COO Panel. He also sits on the DfE Advisory Board and he worked with the Chiltern Learning Trust (on behalf of the DfE) to develop the AI toolkit for teachers and leaders. He is passionate about Digital Equity and the role of AI in education, with a focus on business services as well as teaching and learning.

Lt Col Kitty Small
Army Artificial Intelligence Centre



Lt Col Kitty Small is Head of the Army Artificial Intelligence Centre, serving as the Army's authority for Al governance and coherence. A Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers officer with 19 years of service, she has deployed on operations in Iraq and Afghanistan and held NATO appointments in multinational headquarters. In 2018, Kitty was appointed the Chief of the General Staff's Visiting Fellow at Chatham House, where she led research into the implications of Artificial Intelligence for defence and security within the International Security Department.

She later commanded 17 Field Company, 4 Armoured Close Support Battalion REME, leading 120 personnel in delivering operational outputs and training. Following command, she joined the Army Data Analytics Team within the Information Exploitation branch. Kitty is a Chartered Engineer and holds a BEng in Aeromechanical Systems Engineering from the Royal Military College of Science, an MSc in International Relations from the London School of Economics and Political Science, and an MBA from Henley Business School.

# **Laura Spear**Defence Science and Technology Laboratory



A Chartered Occupational Psychologist and Associate Fellow of the British Psychological Society, Laura is a Senior Principal Research Psychologist in the Human Sciences Group at the UK Defence Science and Technology Laboratory (Dstl). Following her BSc (Hons) Psychology and MSc in Social and Organisational Psychology at the University of Exeter, Laura has been working at Dstl as a research psychologist in a range of areas of expertise including influencing human behaviour, cyber human factors and Defence

Personnel research since 2007. Laura is currently responsible as a Dstl Principal Advisor for Future Workforce and Training research and is the current UK National Lead for the Five Eyes Science and Technology Human Resources Panel.

#### Army Sgt Maj WO1 John Miller



Warrant Officer (Class One) Miller joined the Royal Corps of Signals in 1999. He was Regimental Sergeant Major of 16 Air Assault Brigade Headquarters and Signal Squadron (216) before commissioning in 2021. He has held senior soldier positions at every echelon of the Army. His experience spans both Field Army formations and instructional roles within Standina Joint Command. Operationally, he has deployed to multiple theatres, including the Balkans, Iraq, and multiple tours in Afghanistan. Since April 2021, he has been the Command Sergeant

Major of 1st (United Kingdom) Division and subsequently the Field Army. During this time, he supported the introduction of 'How We Fight 26', the modernisation and lethality transformation plan, and the Army's response to the people challenges of recruitment, retention, and culture. On completion of the Intermediate Command and Staff Course (Land) in March 2025, Warrant Officer (Class One) Miller was appointed as the Army Sergeant Major.

### **CLOSING ADDRESS**

#### General Sir Roly Walker KCB DSO ADC Gen Chief of the General Staff



General Sir Roly Walker was commissioned into the Irish Guards in 1993. He commanded the Grenadier Guards in 2009, promoting to the General Staff four years later. He commanded at company, battle group, and brigade levels, variously in Northern Ireland, Afghanistan, Iraq, as well as joint command of global operations. On the Staff he has served in brigade, divisional, army and strategic HQs. He was the Deputy Chief of Defence Staff (Military Strategy & Operations) at the MOD from April 2021, during which time he was responsible for advising on and directing new operations to support the government's response to Covid, the

death of the late Duke of Edinburgh, the withdrawal from Kabul, the full-scale invasion of Ukraine by Russia, the death of the late Queen Elizabeth II and coronation of King Charles III, numerous evacuation operations and most recently the Hamas attacks on Israel. In December 2023 it was announced that General Walker was to be appointed as the new Chief of the General Staff, succeeding General Sir Patrick Sanders. He assumed the appointment on 15 June 2024. He was made a Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath in 2023, and a Companion of the Distinguished Service Order in 2010. General Walker is the President of the Honourable Artillery Company, Army Rugby and Army Winter Sports.
